As I sit here at my kitchen table on May 3rd attempting to organize these thoughts, two separate themes are struggling for preeminence in my mind. The first is of the uncertainty of our lives these days and whether or not this message will have any meaning at all by the time you read it. Uncertainty taints just about every aspect of our lives and makes planning a challenge. Almost every decision seems fraught. Should I go to the doctor's office which is full of sick people or should I ask for a virtual appointment? When will I be able to buy my own groceries without risking my life? And what about all the activities that have been planned for us here in Queens Lake? Will we be able to have a Queens Lake Day this year or will it have to take a different shape on a later date? Will the pool open on time? And what about the Members Social on the 30th of May? I suppose that's been put on hold as well. About the only thing that is certain is that the virus is still out there and will continue to be a threat until a vaccine has been created, proved effective, and approved by the FDA. The date on which that will happen is uncertain.

And then there is the theme of diversity which is the second contestant vying for my attention. Diversity certainly has grown here in Queens Lake. In addition to all its previous meanings, the term "diversity" can now be applied to those of us who are "essential" and those who are "non-essential". For instance, there are those among us who go to work every day because they are essential. On the other hand, there are those of us who are totally non-essential and who, therefore, stay at home and shelter in place. Some essential workers work from home so they pretty much look like non-essential workers except that they get a paycheck. Queens Lake seems to have a good mix of both essential and non-essential workers. Whether one would be classified as essential or non-essential workers while the workers in New York and California seem almost all to be non-essential. Teachers in most states are non-essential while clerks in liquor stores are essential and, as I understand it, race car drivers will soon be classified as essential.

Despite the uncertainty that swirls around us, there are things that remain constant. One of the constants is that, when each of us chose to live in Queens Lake, we chose well. We chose a tight-knit community full of citizens who display the characteristics that are absolutely essential in this life – kindness, neighborliness, concern for others, a willingness to help each other and to take on the challenges that help to keep the community vibrant and robust. I am almost certain that my message to you this month is "Hang in there, Queens Lake!" We'll make it through this just as we made it through Isabelle and countless other periods of misery. Take care of yourselves and your neighbors and remember the words of General George Casey Jr, 36th Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army, "Clarity and simplicity are the antidotes to complexity and uncertainty."

- **FUEL PUMP COMPLETE:** On April 3 Jones & Frank completed the installation of the fuel pump under the watchful of Craig Marcuson. The 1,000 gallon fuel tank was topped off on March 31, and we are now selling ValvTect (marine) fuel @ \$2.40 per gallon.
- **SANITARY PUMP OUT**: We still have to replace a switch and a hose on the pier unit. Once completed we will test the unit again and report when 100% operational.
- **DOCKWA:** We have entered all slips and current renters into the system. As this report, over \$4,200 in receipts has been paid using the platform.

DRAINAGE & EROSION STUDY AND REMEDIATION:

Bev Webb provided me with information regarding building tiered retention basins (check dams) to control runoff on the right slope of the marina drive where the large rocks are currently placed. It is my hope that this work can be <u>included</u> in the scope of work identified for the full project as there are also drainage issues on the left side and parking issues. Three Marina Committee members (Kolloff, Marcuson, Hager) have asked to be included in the decision making process as this process moves forward.

REPAIRS & MAINTENANCE: <u>Parking Lot Gravel</u>; installed 2/28; total cost \$4,339.62 <u>Pier-Piling Work</u>: Funding approved by Membership at March 31 meeting/bidding.







The operating budget looks good through the end of April, with many of those who'd been late in making dues payments submitting their money. About 20 households are still outstanding.

Thanks to the work of the Pool and Clubhouse committees, we have contingency plans for the rest of the year, in case we are unable to resume normal operations and revenue streams. They have good preliminary plans in place to weather this, and the Clubhouse is especially well situated with substantial reserves to endure a prolonged lapse in revenues. They are the only areas of operation that appear to be in danger of being significantly affected by a drop in revenue without a corresponding reduction in maintenance expense.

We have completed the search for a financial advisor, having selected Davenport. The paperwork for Davenport to have the ability to assume management is underway, and probably will have been completed by the time of the Board's meeting. It's been a long spring and understandably, many are anxious to return to some sense of normalcy as we move into summer. For many, including myself, thoughts of carefree days at the pool with friends and family are top of the list. While we are moving forward with plans to try to open the pools, we do not yet know exactly when that will be and what a day at the pool will look like amid the many hurdles presented by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The situation remains fluid and we are bound by the state's Forward Virginia blueprint for phased in opening of pools and recreational facilities. We are also bound by our obligation to serve the health, safety and recreational needs of our entire community. Finally, we have a fiduciary responsibility to our community's financial health. As we plan, the health and safety of ALL members is our #1 priority and we are doing everything in our power to ensure that any opening will happen in a safe, thoughtful and responsible manner.

While many things are uncertain, it is certain that a day at the pool will not look exactly like it has in the past. In opening, we will follow reasonable and current public health guidelines at our facilities, keeping in mind that the more time you spend and the closer in space you are to any potentially infected person, the higher the risks. Interacting with more people raises risk yet being outdoors is less risky than being indoors. Pool water has the advantage of chlorine that is not friendly to the virus and therefore is an unlikely source of infection, according to experts. The key question is...can we ensure that we can stay at least 6 feet apart while enjoying the pool? While closer contact with those we live with is ok, the joy of the pool is playing and socializing with friends we have hardly seen since last summer. Can we keep a distance from others at the pool? This is especially difficult for kids at a pool.

So, as we navigate these unchartered waters together, flexibility, cooperation and understanding are more important than ever and your family's and your neighbor's health depend on it. If/when we are able to open the pools, many new procedures and rules will be necessary, and we will all have to agree to abide by them. To give you an idea of what to expect, in keeping with the current guide-lines (which could change) we will have a more rigorous sign in procedure, and restrooms and furniture will require frequent cleaning. Congregating and furniture will be limited, showers and changing space will not be available, and bathroom use will be one at a time. Grills will not be available, pool toys should be left at home (except necessary personal floatation devices), and we will not have space for parties. Finally, as we move through the state's phases of reopening, our capacity may be limited, which could require a different sort of scheduling.

As you can see, it is complicated and the pool committee is working very hard on your behalf. As much is out of our control and we do not yet have a firm date for opening, we are hopeful we will be opening sometime in mid to late June. Please stay tuned.

Initial Spring clearing and grubbing of Queens Lake dam has been completed. Regular mowing will take place approximately every six weeks for the growing season.

JackCrete of Virginia is ready to perform the concrete repairs for the lake spillway. Work is weather depend. The water flow over the spillway needs to be diminished for a short period to allow the work. The work should be complete in one working day.

VDOT was contacted and filled in sink holes that had formed around the guardrail posts on the east side of the spillway.

York County Fire Department was contacted and removed the wooden backstop around the fire department pump-out stand. The pump-out stand is maintained and used by the fire department for emergency conditions.

An engineering firm – A. Morton Thomas and Associates, Inc. has been selected for the engineering study on the dam stability and long term durability. They will be conducting a site investigation; surveying and geotechnical borings to develop suggested repairs and/or improvements. Their work should begin in June and be completed by the end of summer. The goal is to have their recommendations in hand for the General Membership to review by November meeting or sooner.

The lake continues to be surveyed for evidence of the curlyleaf weed grass. At this time, no major treatment regime has been deemed necessary.

- 1. Power washed clubhouse front concrete pad and steps leading to the Marina driveway.
- 2. Painted hand railings on both sides of the steps along with the mail box and post, plus adding a house number to the mail box.
- 3. Repaired and painted hand railing leading from clubhouse to pool parking lot.
- 4. Removed metal edging along driveway leading to pool parking lot . We will be removing one more piece weather permitting. The edging being removed had sharp corners and could cause damage to vehicle tires. Also, some of the edging had clasped and was serving no purpose.
- 5. Waiting for better weather to re-mark the parking lanes in the pool parking lot. Rollers and pads have been purchased. We understand paint is stored at clubhouse.
- 6. Purchased, picked up and delivered half ton of #3 stone to the small parking area adjacent to the Marina driveway. Ruts were filled that could cause damage to vehicles.
- 7. Have written York County representative (twice) to confirm their area of responsibility and schedule for maintaining those areas. Still waiting for response.
