Board Briefs

June 11, 2024

Motion to approve the May 13, 2023 Board Meeting Minutes: Sean Askew made a motion to approve the minutes and Monty Fleck seconded. All approved and the motion passed.

Motion: BOD/Lake: Doug Ellis made a motion to contract with the Edgewater Environmental Services company to monitor Queens Lake and Princess Pond. Monty Fleck Seconded. All approved and the motion passed

Motion: BOD/Membership: Julie Dooley made a motion to remove the \$750 (half down) stock purchase fee option for Traditional membership application and require that the entire stock purchase fee of \$1,500 be paid at one time. After discussion, the motion was amended to become effective on July 1, 2024, seconded by Sean Askew, eight members approved, two opposed and the motion passed.

Motion: BOD/Recreation: Bruce Keener made a motion proposing a ballot item for the (June 15th) Stockholder Special meeting to move forward with a proposal to convert upper tennis court (Court #1) to pickleball use with appropriate changes to the By-Laws and Directors Handbook. Monty Fleck seconded. After discussion, the motion was struck down/withdrawn and the focus of the Shareholder Meeting would be open to discuss repairs to all facilities.

Also moved by Bruce Keener a motion to proceed with court restorations requiring shareholder authorization of an additional expenditure of \$40,989 over the currently budgeted \$37,000. Monty Fleck seconded. nine members approved, one opposed and the motion passed.

Motion to approve the June 16, 2023 Special Board Meeting Minutes: Sean Askew made a motion to approve the minutes Monty Fleck seconded. All approved and the motion passed.

Motion: Clubhouse/Vice President: Chuck Hretz made a motion to request an additional \$1,000 to paint the exterior of the clubhouse. Monty Fleck Seconded. Nine members approved, one opposed, Motion passed. Also, Chuck Hretz moved to extend the special pricing agreement with the yoga group through August 2025. Julie Dooley seconded, all approved, motion passed.

Motion: Finance: Tom Cho made a motion to move \$4,500 for mowing out of the Lake budget because that responsibility has been taken over by York County. After discussion, an amended motion to move \$3,500 was seconded by Sean Askew. All approved and the motion passed.



As this year progresses, I am reminded of the beginning of the iconic book "The Tale of Two Cities" by Charles Dickens. He wrote "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times…" Having accomplished a transformative agreement with York County to address our existential problem concerning the dam and lake, we find ourselves with an unfamiliar situation. We have long term financial viability that we haven't been able to visualize in recent history. It is both inspiring and daunting at the same time. The composition of the Strategic Planning committee should help organize our big capital expenditures. All the facilities want their fair share and we intent to help each of them reach their objectives over the next several years.

Conversely, the transition of our accounting procedures has been tumultuous. We have suffered setbacks in moving to a more sustainable and efficient process. We recently met with our bookkeeping service to streamline our procedures and are hopeful that it will bear fruit. Change happens continually and adaptation is rarely easy. But we have plenty of talent, commitment and cooperation to adjust along the way. While we are in this period of transformation, we are realizing there are many factors affecting our operation. Families are busier than ever so volunteering has become harder to rely on. Inflation is persistent and affecting every aspect of cost, from pool chemicals, employee compensation to cancelled bids for capital projects. We are looking for ways to address these trends and simplify our operations for future generations of QLCA to function properly.

Lastly, I want to encourage those who are able, to volunteer to serve on the Board. Come with a spirit of cooperation and an open mind to the perspective of others. There are so many accomplished people amongst us, I feel we can make great strides toward our goals with an open, respectful exchange of ideas.





The Lake Committee received the first quarterly report from Edgewater Environmental, which conducted an inspection and lab samples of the Lake. The lab analysis for water quality was satisfactory and indicated no urgent action. The visual inspection noted several limbs and trees in the water, and noted the increased aquatic vegetation at the upstream head of the Lake. The lake consultant provided an estimate of approximately \$10,000 by mechanical means (hydroraking) to remove the invasive vegetation to promote better water channel flow. The Lake Committee will be soliciting other quotes and make a recommendation.

The current consultant is merging with another company and will be unable to continue with quarterly inspections after September. The Committee is reaching out to other firms to provide this service.

York County is waiting for final agency approval for the combined project to include repairs for the dam, concrete spillway and ravines. An update from the Dept of Public Works is expected soon. In addition, with the help of Supervisor Holroyd and the endorsement of County Administrator and Board of Supervisors, Congressman Wittman contacted the National Park Service in Washington to request stormwater funding for the Lake. Discussions are underway and ongoing.

Committee members are conducting a second inspection of Lake access to determine delinquent boat decals and notify owners. Abandoned or unregistered boats may be auctioned off. Members can register canoe or kayaks on the website at <u>https://queenslake.net/_documents/lake//</u> <u>Boat_Registration_Form.pdf</u> and decals can be picked up at the office on Monday, Wednesday and Friday 12-3pm. In addition, a maintenance inventory will be conducted to prioritize replacement or repairs of dock, signage and boat racks.



Since the installation of No-Parking signs by VDOT, trespassing and unidentified parked cars on the dam have dramatically reduced.

The Committee is also planning family-oriented events for next year to promote more use and appreciation of the Lake.


THANKS TO ALL OUR VOLUNTEERS:





Two Neighborhood Items of Note:

- 1. Throughout this past summer there has been an increase in incidents concerning safety within our neighborhood. Some of these incidents have included trespassing of private property, vandalism, and women/minors being approached by men behaving strangely/asking suspicious questions. Neighbors have reported these events to the York County Sheriff's Department, who have been responsive in increasing patrols in our neighborhood. If you observe suspicious behavior in the neighborhood, please report it to the Sheriff's Department promptly. It is our collective responsibility to keep our neighbors and neighborhood safe.
- 2. Queens Lake residents should prepare for detour traffic delays during Phase 3 of the Colonial Parkway Rehabilitation Project. The Colonial Parkway closures of segments F and G, happening simultaneously, will result in Queens Lake and nearby neighborhoods being detoured around the corner of Hubbard and Penniman (where Magruder Elementary is located). The Parkway closure is projected to begin in Winter 2024 and parkway closures are estimated to last 12-18 months.
